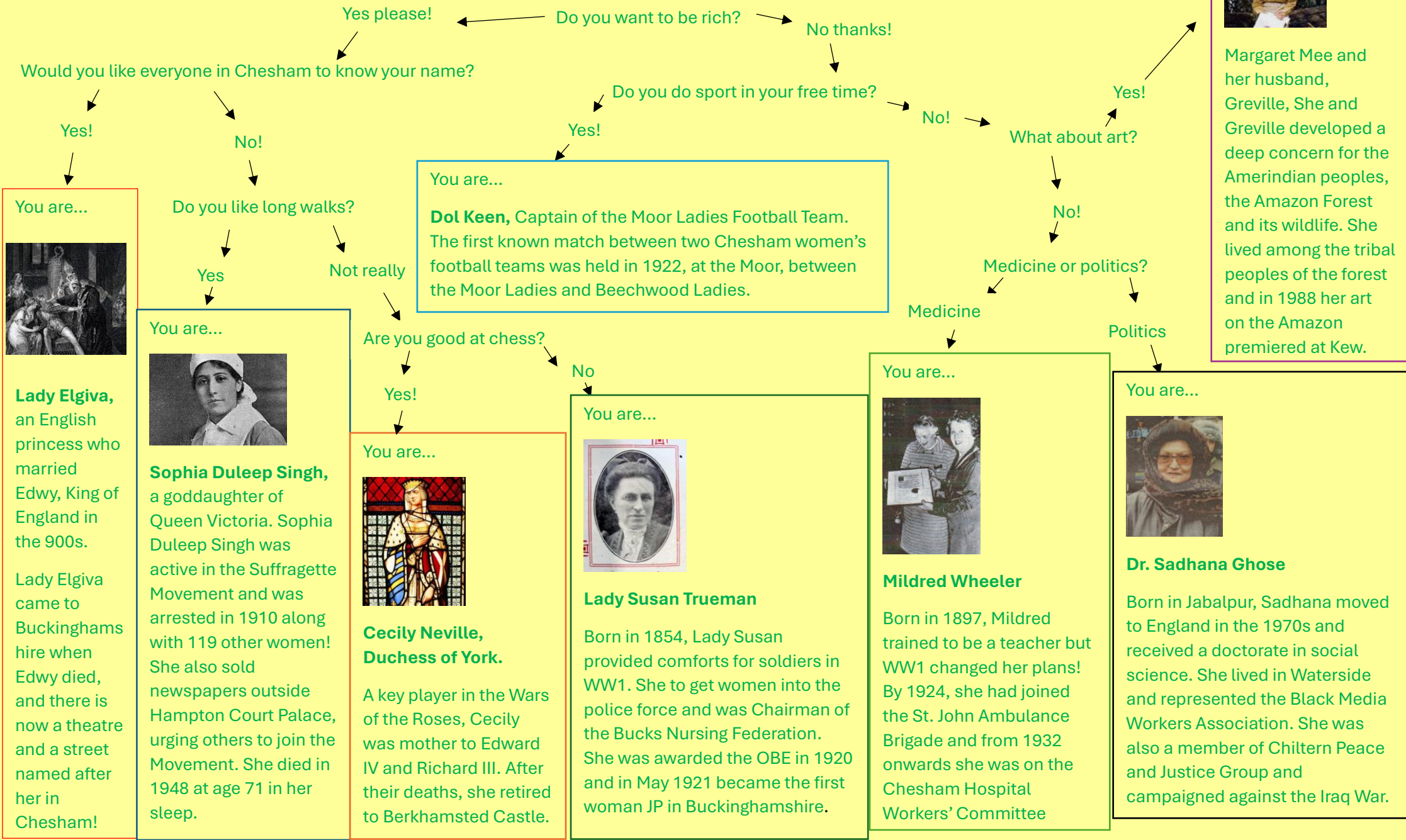


**There are lots of influential women from Chesham and the surrounding area! Who are you in history?**



You are...

**Margaret Mee**



Margaret Mee and her husband, Greville, She and Greville developed a deep concern for the Amerindian peoples, the Amazon Forest and its wildlife. She lived among the tribal peoples of the forest and in 1988 her art on the Amazon premiered at Kew.

You are...



**Lady Elgiva**, an English princess who married Edwy, King of England in the 900s.

Lady Elgiva came to Buckinghamshire when Edwy died, and there is now a theatre and a street named after her in Chesham!

**Sophia Duleep Singh**, a goddaughter of Queen Victoria. Sophia Duleep Singh was active in the Suffragette Movement and was arrested in 1910 along with 119 other women! She also sold newspapers outside Hampton Court Palace, urging others to join the Movement. She died in 1948 at age 71 in her sleep.

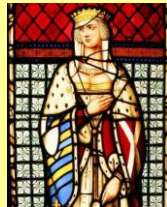
You are...

**Dol Keen**, Captain of the Moor Ladies Football Team. The first known match between two Chesham women's football teams was held in 1922, at the Moor, between the Moor Ladies and Beechwood Ladies.

**Cecily Neville, Duchess of York.**

A key player in the Wars of the Roses, Cecily was mother to Edward IV and Richard III. After their deaths, she retired to Berkhamsted Castle.

**Lady Susan Trueman**

Born in 1854, Lady Susan provided comforts for soldiers in WW1. She got women into the police force and was Chairman of the Bucks Nursing Federation. She was awarded the OBE in 1920 and in May 1921 became the first woman JP in Buckinghamshire.

**Mildred Wheeler**

Born in 1897, Mildred trained to be a teacher but WW1 changed her plans! By 1924, she had joined the St. John Ambulance Brigade and from 1932 onwards she was on the Chesham Hospital Workers' Committee

**Dr. Sadhana Ghose**

Born in Jabalpur, Sadhana moved to England in the 1970s and received a doctorate in social science. She lived in Waterside and represented the Black Media Workers Association. She was also a member of Chiltern Peace and Justice Group and campaigned against the Iraq War.
